**A BILL**

To fix the compensation of officers and employees of the Legislative Branch of the Government.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 SECTION 1. The following positions and annual (except  
4 where specified otherwise) rates of compensation are hereby
